Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

The average City of Sydney household sends 10kg of general waste to landfill each week and much of this material can be put to a better use, re-used or recycled.

Why it's important

Doing this helps to lessen our impact on the environment. We're running out of landfill sites in Sydney. If we keep generating waste at the current rate, our landfill sites will soon reach their limit.

Recycling is just one easy way to 'recover' resources -Recovering materials like glass, plastic, paper and even food, so they don't become waste means we save on the natural resources and the energy it might take to produce something from entirely new materials.

Top tip

Separate your waste from your recyclables

Mixed Container Recycling



What happens to it?

Mixed containers are separated and sorted at the materials recovery facility and then sent to be reprocessed at various locations. Plastics may be reprocessed into clothing like winter fleeces. Aluminium cans could be used to build aeroplanes.



Top tips

- Buy products with recyclable packaging
- Use separate containers for waste and recycling
- Remove lids
- Lightly rinse your recycling items
- Leave labels on these are removed in the recycling process

- Steel and aluminium cans, aerosols, jar lids and saucepans, foil and foil trays
- ✓ Glass bottles and jars clear, brown, green and blue coloured.
- Disposable plastic containers numbered 1-7 (excluding polystyrene), food, drink, cleaning and personal care product containers
- ✓ Cartons Liquid paperboard milk, juice cartons and tetra packs





- X Light globes, mirrors and window glass
- X Broken crockery (cups and plates), ceramics or Pyrex
- X Plastic bags, wrap, film and bubble wrap
- X Polystyrene foam meat trays, take-away containers and packaging
- X Sharps / syringes
- Disposable nappies
- X Plastic toys
- X Mixed cardboard and steel containers (eg. chip cylinders)



Paper and Cardboard Recycling



What happens to it?

Paper is taken to a paper mill and made into new cardboard boxes.

Top tips

- Don't worry about removing staples and plastic windows
 these are removed in the recycling process
- ★ If boxes are too large for the recycling bin flatten, fold, bundle, tie neatly put them in the right place in the bin storage area

Having a 'No Advertising Material' sticker on your mailbox helps prevent unsolicited junk mail. Call the Distribution Standards Board on freephone 1800 676 136 to find out how to get a sticker or buy one from a hardware store.

- Cardboard packaging
- ✓ Flattened cardboard boxes
- Egg cartons
- ✓ Telephone books and clean paper bags,
- ✓ Newspapers, magazines and junk mail
- ✓ Office paper
- ✓ Envelopes and tissue boxes with windows
- ✓ Empty pizza boxes without any food residue





- X Food-soiled paper and cardboard
- X Waxed paper and cardboard
- X Tissues and napkins
- Mixed cardboard and steel containers (eg. chip cylinders)



Garden Organics Recycling - Green Waste



What happens to it?

Garden organics are reprocessed into mulch (wood chip) and soil conditioner (compost) for reuse.

Top tips

- Put all garden organics in a bin with the lime green lid
- Cut large branches into 1m lengths, bundle them so they're not too heavy to lift, tie with a natural fibre string and put them neatly next to the bin
- Bear in mind garden organics placed in boxes or plastic bags won't be collected
- Keep it to 2 cubic metres per booking this is up to a small box trailer load





Did you know?

Your Building Manager or Body Corporate can book a fortnightly garden organics waste collection service and order a green waste bin. Ask them to call 9265 9333 for a booking and check out our green waste calender on the web.

- ✓ Branches (under 10cm thick)
- Leaves
- ✓ Grass clippings
- ✓ Shrub prunings
- Weeds
- ✓ Flowers



- X Plastic bags
- X Food scraps
- Tree stumps or branches thicker than 10cm
- X Tree roots
- X Soil, rock or building materials
- X Treated timber and fence palings
- Plant pots or garden equipment



White Goods Recycling and Household Clean-Up



What happens to it?

White Goods are taken away for metal recycling and made into products like cars and steel cans.


Top tips

- Wrap and label sharp or dangerous items like mirrors and glass
- Keep it to 2 cubic metres per booking this is up to a small box trailer load
- Book your clean-up collection first, then separate white goods from household items and put it out the night before
- Put small items into containers no loose materials will be collected



Did you know?

You can book a White Goods or Household Clean-Up by calling **9265 9333**. Before you do, check with your Building Manager or Body Corporate to find out where the goods should be placed and ask if it's up to you to make the booking.



Handy contacts

- Car Parts and Metals look in the Yellow Pages for your nearest Scrap Metal Recycler



- ✓ Whitegoods (collected separately for metal recycling) with doors removed for safety reasons – refrigerators, washing machines etc.
- ✓ Furniture lounges, rugs, mattresses etc.
- ✓ Appliances televisions, computers, radios, toasters, heaters etc.

(Except for white goods, all items must be less than 1.5m or 100kg)

- X Gas cylinders and vehicle batteries
- X Liquid wastes including motor/cooking oil
- X Carpet and floor tiles
- X Tyres and car parts
- Building and demolition materials
- X Wooden crates and pallets



Keeping your Neighbourhood Clean and Tidy



What happens every day

Each day, our Cleansing Team works hard to remove spills, debris, leaves, litter and dumped material from our roads, laneways and footpaths. You'll see us manually sweep as well use machines to scrub, sweep and even steam-clean the streets of your neighbourhood. Street litter bins and ashtrays are emptied and bill posters, syringes, abandoned items and graffiti are removed.

Even though we're out there daily, there are times when we might miss something. This is where you can help.

- graffiti or bill poster advertising by calling 9265 9333
- syringes by calling the Needle Cleanup Hotline on Freephone 1800 633 353.





Graffiti removal

If you're disposing of syringes and needles at collection points like public hospitals, and participating health centres and pharmacies, they need to be in a strong, puncture resistant container like an Australian Standard Sharps container.

Did you know

Some actions are illegal and can result in heavy fines. These are:

- Household items left on the street they're classed as illegal dumping if you haven't booked a collection
- Littering litter attracts vermin and often ends up in stormwater drains and pollutes the harbour and waterways. Even dropping a cigarette butt can lead to a \$200 fine
- Sweeping leaves or litter from a private property onto the street
- Graffiti and bill poster advertising
- Putting residential and commercial waste in street litter bins – they're for public use only

Remember the four steps to keep waste out of landfill

1. Avoid

- Buy things that last and that can be reused
- Hire or borrow things you use infrequently

2. Reduce

- Buy things with little or no packaging
- Buy only what you need
- Compost or worm farm

Composting and Worm Farming
